The great thing about waiting for the end of the regular season to pass before doing my updates for April is that the NHL Central Scouting front offices release their Final Rankings for the upcoming 2011 NHL Entry Draft.

The few times I spoke to him on the phone were memorable and wildly informative and he will be sorely missed.

As you will find, we have welcomed in two of Central Scouting's top draft-eligible goalies, Team USA goaltender John Gibson and Kitchener Rangers goaltender Mike Morrison. They join top-ranked Finnish prospect Samu Perhonen, Swedish beast Magnus Hellberg and the Finnish-born but domestic-ranked Christopher Gibson as five of the more valuable prospects that are sure to be snagged in Minnesota at this summer's draft.

We also would like to wave a final goodbye to my top-two ranked prospects, Cory Schneider and Jonathan Bernier. They are sure to have long, successful NHL careers, regardless of where they end up over the next two years. The enigma that is James Reimer also graduates from the list at the #9 spot overall.

With the Rangers signing the 6-foot-8 giant Jason Missiaen, he has returned to the rankings after being absent for over a year. I am very interested to see what Rangers goalie coach Benoit Allaire can do to Jason's game over the summer months. If the Rangers are patient, he could turn out to be a gem.

I also made appropriate adjustments for the numerous entry-level contracts that transpired over the last month, including Joni Ortio, Calvin Pickard, newcomer Allen York, Mark Visentin and more. Enjoy! ~ Justin Goldman
