

# SEPTEMBER 2010 UPDATE

The summer has finally come to a close and we couldn't be more excited. Although our updates below (through September 5) are mostly the same as last month, there were still some drastic changes that impacted a handful of our Top-100 prospects.

Most notably would be Jaroslav Janus, who was blindsighted by Tampa Bay's decision to bring in Cedrick Desjardins from the Hamilton Bulldogs. Now there's three legit prospects waiting to see what the coaching staff has in store for them this season. And although we feel he's still a very talented kid, something just isn't sitting right with his future in Tampa Bay.

Thomas Greiss is obviously the other goalie to be blindsighted by a late-summer trade. Antti Niemi landed in San Jose for just one season and literally pushes Greiss right out of an NHL gig. Where he plays this season is unclear, so his value doesn't drop as drastically as Janus' but it could continue to slide if he's the odd man out in San Jose.

Because of those moves, we welcome Chet Pickard back into the Top-10. His future looks brighter than ever with a chance to steal the backup role from Mark Dekanich, who also experiences a solid rise heading into training camp.

Blackhawks prospect Corey Crawford experienced a similar rise in value thanks to the opportunity he has to play behind an awesome veteran and mentor in Marty Turco. It looks like his patience will finally pay off big time.

In the bottom 50 we have a number of new prospects on the radar, including some goalies with legitimate pro futures and others that might be considered a little more far-fetched. Team Canada standout Tyson Teichmann is certainly a prospect to watch this season with Belleville, while David Leggio will have to impress the Sabres' brass to stick around.

Robert Mayer is a prospect to watch since there's a wide open spot in Hamilton and Cameron Talbot was signed by the Rangers with an opportunity to take over Matt Zaba's (who signed in Italy) spot in Hartford. - *Goldman*
