After taking the month of July to refine and expand, The Goalie Guild is proud to publish the first-ever Top-150 Prospects Rankings. This marks an exciting time for us, as we look forward to providing you with insight and analysis on more prospects than ever before.

It was a good decision to stay away from releasing a July update, as the sheer volume of movement due to the NHL Entry Draft and free agency period would have made our rankings obsolete in just a few days.

Because it has been almost two months since our last release, you'll find a vast and extensive amount of movement. Many draft-eligible goalies saw their value rise depending on the team that selected them, while many unrestricted free agents saw their value plummet due to their loss of opportunity.

In terms of the biggest winners, you have to be happy with the new roles for goalies like Mark Dekanich, Niko Hovinen, Henrik Karlsson and J-F Berube. But on the flip side, it was a trifecta of Flyers prospects, Nicola Riopel, Brian Stewart and Joacim Eriksson, who saw their value plummet. All three are still UFA's as of August 5th.

For the goaltenders that were drafted back in late-June, almost all of them raised their value. Jordan Binnington, Magnus Hellberg, Christopher Gibson and John Gibson were the biggest winners, as they all joined teams that provide them with terrific opportunities to evolve into legitimate NHL puck-stoppers.

For the 25 new additions, we are proud to welcome a number of the top draft-eligible goaltenders for the 2012 NHL Entry Draft. This makes following our rankings even more enjoyable, as we'll work hard to keep you updated on their progress as we inch towards the next draft.

In closing, if there were five new additions to keep a close eye on as the season approaches, I would suggest Eric Comrie, Richard Ullberg, Daniel Altshuller, Oscar Dansk and John Curry. ~ Justin Goldman
